Introduction to the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program

Long regarded as the world's premiere academic exchange program, the Fulbright Program attracts exceptional scholars from more than 150 countries worldwide. Among the fastest growing of the bilateral exchanges is the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program. With the support of Foreign Affairs Canada, the United States Department of State and a host of private sector partners, the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program has engaged nearly one thousand students and scholars in high-level academic exchange since its inception in 1990. Administered by the Foundation for Educational Exchange between Canada and the United States of America, the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program strives to enhance mutual understanding between Canada and the United States.

Canada-U.S. Fulbright awards offer Canadian and American students, scholars, and professionals a unique opportunity to explore contemporary issues relevant to Canada and the United States and the relationship between the two countries. In addition to promoting a deeper appreciation of the public policy environment in each country, the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program strengthens binational collaborative research and facilitates the development of long-term institutional linkages between the two countries.

Who Are Fulbright Scholars

The Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program operates on the principle of reciprocal exchange and provides the opportunity for Canadian and American students and scholars to lecture, research and/or study in their host country. Fulbright award recipients include exceptional students, scholars, and professionals in a wide variety of disciplines at various stages in their academic careers, including prominent and emerging scholars, graduate students, doctoral candidates, post-doctoral researchers and professionals. Alumni of the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program are leaders among their peers as well as important ambassadors working to further mutual understanding between Canada and the United States.

The Foundation recognizes that excellence is found in all linguistic, ethnic and religious groups without regard for gender, age, sexual preference or race. The Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program encourages applications from all interested and eligible candidates.

Types of Awards

Post-doctoral researchers, emerging and established faculty members, as well as experienced professionals are eligible to apply for a Fulbright scholar award if they are seeking to conduct research, to lecture or to undertake a combination of both activities at an American institution.

Traditional Fulbright Awards are intended for candidates who wish to lecture, conduct research or undertake a combination of both activities at an academic institution of their choice in the United States.

Fulbright Visiting Research Chair Awards offer candidates the opportunity to fill a specific position associated with a particular field identified by The Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program and the host institution. Please note that some Visiting Chairs have a teaching requirement. For information on specific arrangements please consult www.fulbright.ca.

General Regulations

While the competition is officially "field open," applications in the following areas are given preference: comparative public policy; public health; international trade; North American integration; security; communications; culture; ecology and the environment; indigenous issues; law; border issues; Canada-U.S. relations; Canadian studies; and, American studies. All applicants are required to demonstrate their project's relevance to the Program's mandate. Candidates who wish to pursue studies as medical students are not eligible. Candidates with medical degrees may receive grants for advanced academic study, but not for internships, residencies, or clinical trials.

All award recipients must be affiliated with an institution in the United States and are responsible for securing such affiliation, with the exception of applicants to the Visiting research Chairs Program. Applicants are encouraged to establish an affiliation with the intended host institution at an early stage. Please note that while most award recipients are affiliated with a university or college in the United States, institutional affiliation may also be secured with a non-profit organization, such as a museum or research centre, as appropriate to the proposed project.

Fulbright award recipients must enter the United States on a J-1 visa under the Exchange Visitor Program. All award recipients must meet current J-1 visa requirements, including the return residency requirement. Accordingly, grantees are required to return to Canada for at least two years at the conclusion of their Fulbright grant.



Eligibility Requirements

- Canadian citizenship at time of application (permanent resident status or landed immigrant status are not sufficient)
- English language proficiency
- Ph.D. or equivalent professional/terminal degree completed by December 31, 2009 or equivalent professional experience

Please note that you are **not** eligible for a Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program award if:

- You are a dual citizen of Canada and the United States
- You currently hold permanent resident status in the United States
- You are currently residing in the United States or are enrolled at a university or college in the United States
- You have resided abroad for five or more consecutive years in the six year period immediately preceding the date of application
- You have received a Fulbright award within the last five years
- You have had recent substantial experience in the United States (defined as extended study, teaching, research or employment for a period of more than an academic year (nine months) during the past five years.)
- You are currently, or have been in the last year, a local employee of a U.S. mission abroad, or have an immediate family member who works for the U.S. Department of State

Award Provisions

Fulbright grants are awarded for periods ranging from one semester to a full academic year (nine months), to coincide with the academic year of the host institution: September to May. Awards are not available for the summer months only, nor are awards available solely for attendance at professional conferences or meetings.

Traditional Fulbright awards provide a fixed sum award of US\$25,000 for one nine-month academic year. Awards are pro-rated for terms of a shorter duration. Provisions for Fulbright Visiting Research Chair awards are particular to each host institution; though normally carry a value of US\$25,000 for one semester. For detailed information, please refer to the Fulbright web site. Faculty sabbatical, leave-of-absence, or retirement pay may be used concurrently with Fulbright support. Please note that all Fulbright awards are subject to Revenue Canada and Internal Revenue Service regulations.

The Canada-U.S. Fulbright Award Application Process

The Foundation will notify you by e-mail when your complete application package has been received. Please do not contact the Foundation for information on the status of your application. Once your application is determined to have satisfied all eligibility requirements, it will be forwarded to the Canada U.S. Fulbright Program Adjudication Committee for review. At this point, your application will either be recommended or not recommended for a Fulbright award by the Adjudication Committee. All applicants will be notified of the status of their application following the Adjudication Committee meeting. Recommendation by the Adjudication is only the first of several steps in the process and does not guarantee a Fulbright award. The Committee recommends more candidates than available awards. Applications of recommended candidates are then forwarded to the Academic Committee of the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program's Board of Directors and the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board in Washington, D.C. for approval. Applicants are normally notified of the final decision by April 15th.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Must I return to Canada after completing my research or teaching in the United States?

A. Yes. Both the Fulbright regulations and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services require that exchange visitors return to their home country for a minimum of two years upon completion of their research project or the expiration of their visa.

Q. Does the Foundation support post-doctoral work?

A. Yes. If you will have received your Ph.D. by December 31, 2009, you must use the application form for Canadian faculty members and experienced professionals. If, however, you will not have completed your Ph.D. by the end of the fall semester, you must complete the application form for Canadian graduate students and junior professionals.

Q. I have not yet received a letter of invitation from a host institution. Am I eligible to apply?

A. Yes. Indicate on the application form that you are in the process of discussing arrangements with your host institution and forward a copy of the letter of invitation to the Foundation upon receipt. Proof of existing contact with your host institution would be an asset to your application.

Q. Is there a preference for lecturing - or research-oriented projects?

A. No. Each application is reviewed on its own merits, without regard for whether the project will be primarily research or teaching.

How to Prepare a Competitive Application

- Emphasize how the project will benefit colleagues at the host institution, or scholars in the proposed field of study in Canada and in the United States.
- Evaluation criteria include: academic record and professional background; proposed program of study or research project; and adherence to the aims of the Canada-US Fulbright Program.
- Discuss how the proposed project will encourage the development of long-term institutional linkages, academic networks, and collaborative research between Canada and the United States.
- Emphasize how your project will enhance understanding of the relationship between Canada and the United States.
- Include a letter of invitation from the host institution, if possible, or provide proof of communication between yourself and the host institution.
- Write a clear and concise project statement, which acts as a professional introduction to your colleagues here and in the United States. It should be written in a manner suitable for review by a non-specialist in your field.

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

General Remarks

1. All forms in this application are to be completed in English and must be typewritten in black ink or printed from a computer. Font size must not be less than 10 points.
2. Every question must be answered completely. Incomplete applications will not be considered. Please limit your responses to the space provided.
3. Please note that neither the application package nor the letters of reference may be submitted by fax.
4. Please submit **SEVEN SETS** (the original and six copies) of items 1 through 6 listed below. Each set is to include one of each item, in the order listed. Please write "original" in the top right corner of the original set and paperclip together (do not staple original). Firmly staple each of the six duplicate sets in the upper left corner. Do not put material in a binder or duo-tang. For all attachments to the application form use 8½" x 11" white paper with 1" margins and 12 point font size.
5. Submit only the items requested; unsolicited materials will not be included in the review process.
6. Completed applications should be returned to the Foundation as soon as possible. Applications received must be post-marked no later than November 15. You will be notified if any part is missing.

A COMPLETE APPLICATION CONSISTS OF ITEMS 1 THROUGH 9 AS DETAILED BELOW.

Please note that items 1 through 5 are to be submitted by the applicant directly to The Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program, along with the checklist (item 9). Items 6 to 8 are to be submitted directly to the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program by the issuing institution or referee.

1. Canadian Scholar Application Form

All sections must be completed. The application form provides an overview of your most important accomplishments and your research/study objectives in addition to providing biographical information. Do not write *Please see attached CV* in any of the fields.

2. Project Statement

The project statement is an important component of your application package and is required of all applicants. You should take great care in writing a clear and detailed description of the project you intend to pursue. For all types of awards, you must demonstrate that residence in the United States is essential for your project, that knowledge in a particular area of learning will be advanced, and that plans have been made for the dissemination of the results both in Canada and the United States. Clearly show your project's relation to the study of the United States or the relationship between Canada and the United States and demonstrate the way in which mutual understanding between the two countries will be enhanced (i.e. development of long-term institutional linkages, relevance to contemporary public policy debate, shared knowledge in a particular area of research, etc). For additional instructions specific to each award category, applicants should consult the information below.

Your 'Project Statement' will be evaluated on its academic merit, feasibility of the project, and suitability to the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program. It must not exceed four pages.

Lecturing Awards

- outline proposed lecturing activity
- note areas of expertise within field of study
- discuss your teaching experience
- if your proposal is part of a longer-term project, please elaborate
- explain choice of institutional affiliation
- describe project goals and end-product
- discuss the significance of the project for the field
- attach a sample syllabus (in addition to the 4 page project statement)

Research Awards

- discuss research questions
- explain methodology to be employed
- outline expected timeline for completion of project
- if your proposal is part of a longer-term project, please elaborate
- explain choice of institutional affiliation
- describe project goals and end-product
- discuss the significance of the project for the field
- attach a one-page select bibliography (in addition to the 4 page project statement)

Lecturing & Research Awards

For projects undertaking a combination of lecturing and research, whether in the traditional grant category or as a visiting chair, please comment on all of the applicable points listed above. Attach a bibliography and sample syllabus to the 4 page project statement.

3. Curriculum Vitae

Please submit a curriculum vitae, not to exceed eight pages. Please include scholarships or fellowships held at present or in the past, academic honours or prizes that you have received (with titles and dates), a list of publications (especially in your proposed field of research), professional societies or other organizations in which you now hold membership or in which you have been active in the past, teaching experience and research activities, in addition to employment and volunteer work.

4. Personal Statement

Please submit a one-page narrative statement discussing your professional and academic development as well as future plans. With reference to your personal qualities and experience, please discuss your ability to represent Canada in the United States. Your 'Personal Statement' should not be a mere listing of facts, nor should it repeat the content of your statement of proposed study or research or C.V. Rather, it should include information about your education and career, scholarly activities, special interests, and the reason for which you wish to conduct research or lecture in the United States. Given that the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program seeks to further mutual understanding between Canada and the United States, please highlight any experiences that demonstrate your ability to adapt to other cultural settings, a willingness to share with or learn from others of different national identities, and your ability to act in an ambassadorial capacity for Canada. Please note that your Personal Statement is limited to one page.

5. Letter of Invitation

Include a letter of invitation or acceptance from your host institution or, if you have not received a letter, please attach any relevant correspondence from the institution in the United States. If you have not yet received any correspondence from the host institution, please forward the correspondence to the Canada-U.S. Fulbright Program upon receipt.

6. Confidential Letters of Reference

Please arrange for the submission of letters from three persons qualified to evaluate your academic and professional development and personal suitability to the program. Your referees should include at least one colleague in your field from outside your home institution. If you have held a recent long-term appointment at another university or college, one of your referees should be from a colleague at that institution. A cover sheet is provided in this application package for distribution to each of the referees. You may also direct your referees to www.fulbright.ca/en/seniorscholar.asp where the cover sheet is available separately to download. Please also provide each referee with a copy of your project statement.

7. English Language Proficiency Report

If your first language is not English, you are required to submit a language proficiency report to attest to your competence in English. Please see attached English Proficiency Report for further details.

8. Confidential Transcripts

If you have received your Ph.D. within the last five years, an official transcript is required from each post-secondary institution that you attended, including those schools from which you did not receive a degree. Official transcripts from each post-secondary institution should be mailed directly to the Foundation by the issuing institution. Transcripts must be submitted in English or accompanied by an official translation.
